# Outpatient Pediatric Rehabilitation



WVU Medicine – Berkeley Medical Center Outpatient Pediatric Rehabilitation works to develop individual treatment plans tailored to each child's specific needs to receive personalized care and attention.

#### **Common Diagnoses:**

- Developmental Delay 
  Cerebral Palsy 
  Down's Syndrome
- Social Skills Delay 
  Spinal Cord and Traumatic Brain Injury
- Sensory Integration disorders 
  Autism Spectrum disorders
- Feeding/eating disorders 
  Perceptual/motor disturbances
- Alternative Communication Needs Torticollis
- Spina Bifida Dysphagia Cognitive Delays

Appointments are based on medical necessity and insurance authorization; Interdisciplinary co-treatment between Occupational, Physical, and Speech Therapists may be recommended.



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### Occupational Therapy

Therapist and child work together to develop or improve the necessary skills for daily living through activity and "play".

Treatments focus on skills needed for coordination, school readiness and performance, self-care help such as self-feeding, dressing and grooming, focus and attention, play/social interaction, eye-hand coordination, regulatory behaviors, and more.

### Physical Therapy

Assists in early detection of health problems and uses a wide variety of treatment options to manage disorders, including congenital, developmental, neuromuscular, skeletal, or acquired conditions.

Treatments focus on improving motor skills, balance, coordination, strength and endurance.

### Speech Therapy

Pediatric Speech Therapy is beneficial if your child has trouble putting words together, can't pronounce their works correctly, stutters, has difficulty with sensory processing or has trouble with language comprehension. Speech and language disorders are often common in children with autism, down syndrome, sensory processing disorder, childhood apraxia of speech, cleft-palate, traumatic brain injury and many other syndromes.

Swallowing disorders are also treated by a Speech-Language Pathologist. Swallowing therapy is appropriate if the child has trouble with gagging/choking while eating or drinking or are considered picky eaters.
