For the past 29 years, Dr. Gene Duremdes (Dr. Gene) has been in private practice here in Princeton with his father, Dr. Generoso Duremdes (lovingly known as Dr. Dad). Dr. Dad will celebrate his 85th birthday this year. The West Virginia State Board of Medicine does not renew clinical practice licenses for physicians after age 85. With Dr. Dad coming to the end of his surgical career, the timing was right for Dr. Gene to consider joining the hospital.

The opportunity at MMG General Surgery will enable him to continue to practice surgery in Princeton and

care for his patients but will lift some of the administrative responsibilities – running a practice, human resource issues, and billing and coding. Dr. Gene said, "All of that responsibility was going to be taking a lot of time away from my ability to take care of my patients, and that's the most important thing for me. Caring for my patients is what I want to enjoy, especially as I enter the latter part of my career. I am now 60 and, Lord willing, I am hoping for another seven to ten years of practice. I want to be able to devote all my time to the care of my patients. I don't want to feel overburdened by other responsibilities."

The integration of Dr. Gene with the other surgeons at MMG General Surgery, Dr. David Mullins and Dr. Eric Hopkins, will lead to more comprehensive surgical services for the people of southern West Virginia. Dr. Gene explained, "We have been blessed with a very nice culture here at Princeton Community Hospital for many, many years. The surgeons get along with one another. We are friends, we talk often, and we cover for one another on weekends. The transition to MMG General Surgery has not been a significant change for me. What it has done is integrate all of us into one group, so we all have the same focus and the same attention to caring for patients, with the same mindset and goals of PCH and WVU Medicine. We are full partners in different locations, but we are working toward the same goal."

Dr. Gene is enthusiastic and fully supportive of PCH's full integration into the WVU Medicine healthcare system. He said, "I think this is one of the greatest things that's happened to healthcare in the southern part of the state. Many of the physicians have always

thought that having a real, dedicated, well developed medical center in southern West Virginia is what the area needs. Now that Princeton has joined forces with WVU Medicine, that goal is about to be realized. WVU Medicine has the resources, the personnel, and the network to provide a comprehensive approach to healthcare for all patients in southern West Virginia. Anchoring the southern part of the state, PCH/WVU Medicine will be in a position to provide that care. With WVU Medicine's resources, they will begin to build up this hospital so that it will become a regional medical center. In that, we will see the recruitment of highly needed specialties that we've had difficultly fulfilling in the past.

"Princeton is a wonderful place to live and to practice. When some of the younger doctors begin coming here to see what the area is like, they will realize that it is a jewel. Many people, including students that rotate here, see what a wonderful place this is to live and work. People just need to come here and experience it. The affiliation with WVU

Medicine is a wonderful development. It has been a long time coming, and I think it is exciting to know that we've got the full support of an extensive WVU network. With PCH as the southern anchor, they will now cover the entire state. That will enable us to provide muchneeded specialty care, right here at home.

"The thing I've always enjoyed about practicing in Princeton is this culture we have among the physicians. It is a tribute to the doctors and staff who came before us and developed that culture over many years. We have a very collegial atmosphere. Everyone gets along. We work well together and there is no animosity. We are all friends, we are all busy, and we all have one common goal and that is to provide the best possible care for the people in this area."

President and CEO Karen Bowling said, "We are proud and honored to welcome Dr. Gene Duremdes to Mercer Medical Group General Surgery. Of course, Dr. Gene grew up in this hospital and has practiced alongside his father for nearly three decades. This new role will enable him to devote even more time to caring for his patients."

Dr. Generoso Duremdes is the longest serving physician at PCH, having joined Princeton Memorial Hospital in 1969. In 1989, he introduced laparoscopic gallbladder surgery to PCH. He was the first surgeon in southern West Virginia to operate using the new technology.

In 1993, Dr. Gene joined his father at PCH as a general surgeon. For many years he performed traditional laparoscopy alongside his father. In June 2013, he took the procedure to the next level when he was certified on the da Vinci Robotic Surgical System.

Dr. Gene is an internationally published contributing author with the January 2015 publication of "Advanced Surgical Techniques for Rural Surgeons," a textbook used by surgeons in the United States and abroad.

Ms. Bowling added, "Both Dr. Gene and his father enjoy stellar reputations in the area as respected members of the community as well as outstandingly gifted surgeons. I am excited that Dr. Gene will be joining in full partnership with PCH and the WVU Medicine family of physicians."
