



Leona Hendricks Retires After 51 Years of Dedicated Service to PCH

Leona Hendricks retired on Friday, June 9, 2023, after devoting 51 years to serving the patients at PCH as the Patient Support Service Manager.

Shortly after graduating from Graham High School, Bluefield, Virginia, Leona accepted a full-time position in the admissions department at Princeton Community Hospital on April 17, 1972. She worked admissions for nine months before transferring to a new position in the business office as collection manager. A few months later, the credit manager left, and the decision was made to combine the collection and credit manager responsibilities into one position, Patient Support Service Manager. Leona served in that capacity until her retirement.

Leona Hendricks was born and raised in Tip Top, Virginia, near Tazewell, where she shared a home with her parents, six brothers, and one sister. Her father spent 46 years as a hard-working coal miner at the tipple in Bishop, Virginia, and her mother was a loving homemaker.

Of her 51 years at PCH, Leona said, "When I started in admissions, I worked on a typewriter. And when I moved into the business offices, patient invoices were all on paper and in folders. Computers were just coming into play. I've seen many changes and I've worked with several administrators over the years, but God has really blessed me here. Even though there have been frequent changes with staff, I've always worked



with thoughtful people. When I came here 51 years ago, the hospital was much smaller. You pretty much knew everyone. Now with over 1,200 coworkers, I still know a lot of people, and it is like a big family. I've spent most of my life here, eight hours a day and longer, and it has been a wonderful place to work. It has truly been a blessing, and I thank God for placing me here."

Leona's strong Christian faith is the primary force that has shaped her worldview since her youth. She credits her parents with instilling in her that guiding foundation. She said, "I had godly, Christian parents. They started me out at an early age in church. They taught me to love the Lord and to love everybody. They lived that love by example by opening their home to 76 foster children over the years."

As Patient Support Service Manager at PCH, Leona assisted patients with monthly payment schedules, she prepared numerous monthly reports; if a case required it, she represented the hospital in court; she assisted attorneys with the resolution of insurance contracts; and on a daily basis, she worked with staff throughout the hospital to address patient billing questions.

Leona said, "Working with patients and being able to help them with their bills was very rewarding. I worked with contract staff, DHHR, and Bolder Insurance. They helped patients get Medicaid and disability. But even without that, I could sometimes help patients through our assistance program or with setting up a manageable payment schedule. I'm also thankful to have been on the *Evening of Hope Cancer Care Committee* that helps raise money for local cancer patients. I lost my mom and two brothers to cancer."

Of her family, Leona said, "I have a beautiful daughter, granddaughter, grandson, and a son-in-law who is like a son to me. They live in Oakdale, a suburb of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. I've been blessed to have a wonderful family. The years have gone by so fast. It's like I blinked and they're gone. I can truly say PCH has been a wonderful place to work over the past 51 years. It was a pleasure working with a great Patient Support Service staff and with everyone in Patient Financial Services."

Thank you, Leona, for 51 years of dedicated service, and for the loving kindness you brought to our patients, your fellow employees, and to this organization.

Point-of-Care Ultrasound Workshop Held at WVU Medicine PCH

May 16, 2023: WVU Medicine physicians and advanced practice providers are now equipped with the latest technology to improve patient care immediately, at any bedside.

The Center for Point-of-Care Ultrasound (POCUS) now brings point-of-care ultrasound to patients across the WVU Medicine Health System, enabling practitioners to diagnose life-threatening conditions, guide critical procedures, and more – in real time, decreasing diagnostic errors and reducing healthcare costs.

Faculty at the Center for Point-of-Care Ultrasound recently partnered with the Trauma Center and Department of Emergency Medicine at WVU Medicine Wheeling Hospital, as well as the Departments of Anesthesiology, Emergency Medicine, and Critical Care at WVU Medicine Berkeley Medical Center, to conduct handson POCUS education.

Led by Joseph Minardi, MD, and a group of talented faculty, POCUS came to Princeton Community Hospital to provide training for our physicians and advanced practice providers. Everyone received hands-on practice with multiple applications, including the Focused Assessment with Sonography in Trauma (FAST) exam, abdominal applications, extremity, cardiac and lung, airway, and a variety of POCUS-guided procedures.
