1 Background and Introduction

The Affordable Care Act (ACA) of 2010 requires tax-exempt (non-profit) hospitals to conduct a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) and develop a Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) at least every three years. The regulations for the CHNA include defining the hospital's service area, compiling demographics, and considering input from the community, identifying resources, and prioritizing community health needs. The 2026 Barnesville Hospital and Harrison Community Hospital CHNA identifies the following prioritized needs.

- Mental Health and Substance Use and Abuse (including tobacco and vaping)
- Obesity, Physical Activity, and Nutrition (including co-morbid disease)
- Access to Care and Cancer Treatment

This document serves as a roadmap for development of each hospital's individualized CHIP, and activities will be planned following the completion of the 2026 CHNA. Each CHIP will specify planned actions to be taken by the hospital and community partners, available resources to put towards programming, anticipated steps for planning and standing up each strategy, and items to track for evaluating these activities. Barnesville Hospital and Harrison Community Hospital partnered with West Virginia University's Health Affairs Institute to complete this CHNA. A CHNA process leadership team including hospital and community representation was convened by hospital administration to inform and guide the process.

1.1 About Barnesville Hospital

Barnesville Hospital (Barnesville, OH) began as a maternity hospital in 1928 and was expanded to meet more of the community's needs the following year. This small 16-bed facility was forced to close in 1939 due to lack of funds, then in 1940, citizens began efforts to reopen the hospital. A part-time bookkeeper and a group of thirty-three women revitalized and expanded the hospital, which served the community from 1940-1953. In the early 1950s, it became apparent that more beds and updated technology were needed. By 1954, Mrs. Clara A. Groves, the existing Hospital Auxiliary, and an additional one thousand women had raised enough money for the first addition, which housed new laboratory and x-ray departments, a modern operating room, and new labor and delivery rooms. The updated 33-bed facility gained the service of a radiologist one day a week, and the first surgeon established residence in 1957. Over the decades following, expansions to the facilities and modernization of services offered continued this growth. In July 2004, Barnesville Hospital received federal designation as a Critical Access Hospital, and in 2011 and 2012 was named one of the Top 100 Critical Access Hospitals in the country. An emergency department opened in 2015, and in 2016 Barnesville Hospital was recognized by iVantage Health Analytics and the National Organization of State Office of Rural Health for overall excellence in quality and outcomes, boasting top quarter performance among all rural acute care hospitals in the nation. In early 2019, Barnesville Hospital entered into a management agreement and clinical affiliation with West Virginia University Hospital System.

1.2 About Harrison Community Hospital

Harrison Community Hospital (Cadiz, OH) is a 25-bed critical access hospital that offers a wide range of healthcare services. Harrison Community Hospital has been serving the area since 1970, when area residents saw a need for a local healthcare facility and took action. Due to community dedication and generosity, HCH broke ground in 1968 and saw its first patient in January of 1970. It has served the area ever since.

Through the 1970s and 1980s, HCH added medical offices with private suites for physicians; expanded its operating room, coronary care unit, and materials department; and update their medical technology as advancements were made in society. In 1989, HCH acquired the Scio Medical Clinica from Dr. James Z. Scott.

In the 1990s, HCH saw changes to administration, underwent major renovations, and expanded its offerings with the support of a gift from a long-time Cadiz resident and a contribution from the HCH Auxiliary. The early 2000s brought further expansions of facilities and service offerings, and retirement of its long-time administrator.

HCH became an affiliate of Wheeling Hospital in 2017, and became a full member of the WVU Health System in 2021. During this time, HCH also acquired Custer Pharmacy in Cadiz.

In recent years, HCH has been awarded for its commitment to patient care, improved patient access to clinical information, strengthened response to high-risk situations, enhanced inpatient care offerings and quality of patient communication, and has welcomed a new President and CEO.

Though provision of healthcare has changed significantly throughout the history of HCH, they remain deeply committed to growing with their community, and to providing trusted and compassionate care.

1.3 Previous CHNA Findings

The most recent CHNA for Barnesville Hospital and Harrison Community Hospitals was adopted in 2023. The report included a review of secondary data to assess socioeconomic characteristics, as well as key risk factors facing the community. The final report identified four main health priorities each, with goals and strategies:

- Substance Use and Abuse
- Obesity and Co-morbid Disease
- Physical Activity and Nutrition
- Mental Health

1.4 Definition of the Community Served

For the 2026 community health needs assessment process, the two hospitals identified a combined four-county area as their target for this assessment and its related activities. These include Jefferson, Harrison, Belmont, and Monroe counties in Ohio (Figure 1).

Population and demographics vary across the four counties. The hospital leadership team discussed these factors - as well as ways clinical experiences differ in their two different areas - as part of determining which counties to include for this process. Table 1 contains information from the US Census Bureau and shows the most current QuickFacts (Appendix A).

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2 Methodology and Community Input Process

The CHNA process began with a review of the previous cycle’s priority health topics, implementation of planned activities, and included discussion of publicly available secondary data related to counties within Barnesville and Harrison Community Hospitals’ service areas. These data included the above US Census data and County Health Rankings Data (Appendix B). Using these reports to begin, the leadership team held an initial discussion around health needs, changes in each hospital community’s demographics over the previous few years, input from their health department and school system partners, and lessons learned from the last CHNA cycle.

2.1 Primary Methods of Collecting and Analyzing Information


Primary data collection was conducted by surveying adult community members age 18+ in the four-county service area. Health Affairs collaborated with the hospital leadership team to develop the public input survey (Appendix C). It was disseminated via a web-based platform called Qualtrics as a single anonymous link, and this link was shared broadly in the community with partners, organizations, and civic groups. It was not intended to be a representative scientific sample of residents of these four counties, but rather a convenience mechanism to gather perception of health needs. Respondents could skip any question they chose not to answer. A total of 348 surveys were collected between November 3, 2025 – December 7, 2025.

Questions were designed to gather perceptions of health concerns, quality of life, access to health care and other needed services, and sources of health information seen as trustworthy in the local community. Respondents were also asked basic demographic questions that allowed the Health Affairs team to determine how closely the survey respondent pool aligned with the overall community in terms of things like income and age. Respondents from outside the identified service area were asked to share their city and state, and their responses were reviewed for consideration and discussion as well.

Survey data was analyzed by Health Affairs to ensure there was no significant variation between demographic groups. In December 2025, the data was presented back to the leadership team and community partners in aggregate (Appendix D), as well as individually by county for ease of considering each county’s responses (Appendices E-H). This presentation was focused on reviewing the survey data, discussing community resources and opportunities that may inform community benefit planning, as well as discussing the needs of those not well-represented in the survey data.

Noteworthy limitations included disproportionately low representation from male respondents and from non-white community members. Most respondents were from Belmont County (Figure 2).

2.2 Leadership Team and Community Partners

The following organizations joined staff and providers of the two hospitals to comprise Barnesville Hospital and Harrison Community Hospital’s CHNA leadership team, providing input throughout development of the CHNA. This group informed creation of the public input survey and were instrumental in dissemination of this data collection tool into the community. 3 Community Health Needs Prioritization


3.1 Prioritization Discussion

Following the data presentation, the leadership team discussed all input together and identified priority areas to address through implementation strategies. Leadership reviewed closely the

top community health concerns (Figure 3) as well as additional information raised during the data presentation.

Leadership team members also considered in this priority discussion responses to the question “What do you need that you do not have?” (Table 2) and a question asking for perceptions of the needs of area youth (Table 3).

Health issues were largely consistent when looking across demographics. For example, both men and women selected mental health issues, access to health care, and substance use and abuse among their top three health concerns for their community. Mental health issues and substance use and abuse were also the top two concerns of both white and non-white respondents, with cancer rising into the top three for non-white respondents.

Analyzing the survey data by age and income showed some differences: those over the age of 65 named access to health care as their top health concern, with cancer and substance use falling next in line. Mental health was further down the list for this respondent group, while topics such as aging issues and diabetes ranked higher. Lower income respondents also ranked access to health care at the top, followed by mental health concerns and cancer. Food insecurity and aging issues also ranked higher for those with lower incomes. Demographic breakdowns of top health concern responses can be found in Appendix I.

3.2 Priority Health Topics

Existing secondary data, new survey data and the related community data presentation discussion, as well as lessons learned from the last cycle all factored into the hospitals' prioritization of health topics for the 2026 cycle. The team considered the hospitals' potential impact on each topic, resources that could be devoted to activities, potential collaborations to address each, as well as level of importance placed on each topic by the community. Leadership paid particular attention to the demographics of respondents compared to the community (Appendix J) as well as the responses gathered about access to health care in general. A list of priority health concerns was identified and will be the focus as the team moves forward with implementation planning.

- Mental Health and Substance Use and Abuse (including tobacco and vaping)
- Obesity, Physical Activity, and Nutrition (including co-morbid disease)
- Access to Care and Cancer Treatment

4 Potential Resources

Table 4 documents ideas for implementation strategy development as well as organizations identified during the data presentation who may be potential collaborators for addressing top health concerns. This list will be used as a discussion springboard in the CHIP phase of the needs assessment process.

5 Evaluation of Impact

The previous CHIP was adopted by the Board of Directors in Spring 2024. Since then, all planned activities have been completed or remain underway.

- Monthly Nutrition Classes
 - Activities and education planning designed by the hospitals' Dietitian based on www.choosemyplate.gov curriculum
 - On-site classes with refreshments and take-home educational materials provided
 - Classes were held in January, February, and March of 2024
 - Due to hospital restructuring, the dietitian role was moved to a consultation role from Wheeling Hospital, and classes ceased in March 2024
- Annually, the hospitals sponsor at least one activity for these local high schools' substance use prevention programs:
 - Barnesville High School
 - Belmont Career Center
 - Harrison Career Center
 - Harrison Central High School
 - Union Local High School
 - WVU Medicine Barnesville Hospital will be sponsoring the snacks for completing the drug screenings in Spring 2026 for Barnesville High School, Belmont Career Center, and Union Local High School
 - WVU Medicine Harrison Community Hospital assists with annual drug screenings for the Harrison Career Center
 - Harrison Central High School does not currently offer a substance use prevention program but would like to discuss offering this kind of programming in the future.

- Annually, each hospital sponsors at least two 5K events in their service area each year since 2024, including:
 - Barnesville Pumpkin Festival 5k
 - Harrison County Cancer Crusaders 5k
 - Scio Summer Fest 5K run and Kids Fun Run
 - Santa Sprint held in December

- Each academic year, the hospitals will sponsor an educational speaker to provide a presentation related to mental health to two of the local high schools, covering all four county high schools throughout the implementation cycle
 - Ohio State Highway Patrol Officer Chase Watts provided mental health education to students in 2025 and is scheduled into 2026
 - Harrison Central - Wednesday, September 10, 2025
 - Barnesville High School - Thursday, September 11, 2025
 - Union Local High School - Friday, May 8, 2026
 - Monroe Central High School declined this opportunity at this time

- For the entire month of November each year, both hospitals will provide educational and preventive information about management of diabetes, including print materials and video resources.
 - This activity was completed at both hospitals in 2024. Informational tables were set up for the full month, and videos of seven different providers sharing educational information were also shared during the month of November.

Belmont County is faring about the same as the average county in Ohio for Population Health and Well-being, and about the same as the average county in the nation.


































